The Pastor's Message

I'm grateful to all of you who have been able to join my Entire Bible Study during the Education Hour at 9:00 am on Sundays. Reflecting on my sermon from a year ago, I emphasized that God has a plan for each of us, and studying the Bible helps us discern that plan. I have now covered most of the New Testament. The essential message of the Old Testament in relation to the New Testament will be discussed on October 6 and 13, and the Bible Study will be completed on November 3, 10, and 17 (Please note that my wife and I will be on vacation on October 20 and 27.) I have also decided to publish a summary of each class in the Messenger to benefit those who couldn't attend.

Pastor Dr. Genie Watson, our new Outreach Coordinator, has been actively engaged in various activities. She has been distributing colorful and informative flyers about St. Luke's to businesses around the Church. This has required us to arrange for printing services with a local printer. Pastor Genie can now be reached via cell phone at 484-761-2770 and through email at outreach@stlukesluth.org. To enable her to attend St. Luke's Coffee Hour on Sundays, the Council has initiated a three-month experiment allowing Pastor Genie to conduct the Church's Zoom services from the Conference Room on Sunday mornings at 10:00 am, and this setup seems to be working well. She is developing new outreach ideas for the neighborhood, such as organizing a Trunk-or-Treat event on October 29 (refer to details and flyer on subsequent pages). We encourage everyone to participate as we continue to engage with the neighborhood. Another idea of Pastor Genie's is to open the Clothes Closet for evening hours. Bonnie Wachter and Monica Tucker-Morgan have agreed to manage this on Wednesdays from 5:00 to 7:00 pm, and we are now working on advertising the extended hours of this outreach to people outside the Church.

The Allentown Collaborative Ministries continues to be very active. The Annual Crop Hunger Walk is on Saturday, October 13. It meets at St. Timothy's at 1:00 pm. We also invite you to celebrate Reformation Sunday with us on October 27th. Your presence and support mean everything to us!


The CROP Hunger Walk is a great **intergenerational fellowship and service event** for families, youth groups, adult groups, businesses, organizations, and congregations.



Bishop Eaton statement on Haitian community in Ohio

The recent national spotlight on Haitian immigrants in Springfield, Ohio, clearly has fanned flames of hate and stoked threats of violence. The rhetoric has created discord and mistrust of people who have already suffered civil unrest in their nation and been granted legal protection in the United States. History shows us that this kind of hatred often carries

negative national and global consequences. Our Church teaches that immigrants are children of God, made in God's image and worthy of respect and lives of dignity. God calls us to witness boldly to this truth when people tell dehumanizing lies that perpetuate racist tropes and support white supremacist narratives.

Entire Bible 01 Overview (A Quick Summary)

The entire Bible is huge and mysterious! What is the Bible about? The Bible is about the "meaning of life"! More specifically, the Bible is about Jesus.

Some Statements of Fact: At the center of the Bible is Jesus. Jesus is the most influential person in the history of the world and changed the history of the world. Because of Jesus, the Bible is the most influential book in the history of the world and changed the history of the world. Are these statements scientifically true? Yes! Well-informed atheists and skeptics agree with these statements but would add "for better or for worse," because the Bible's enormous impact has led to many things that are good and to many other things that are not so good. Why should an atheist or skeptic care about the Bible? Because it's impossible to understand the history of the world and the modern world without understanding the impact of the Bible, for better or for worse!

The Bible says "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." (Genesis 1:1) God is almost unbelievably powerful, but also mysterious. This mysterious God chose to reveal himself to humans in a very specific and dramatic way, like a play in three acts -- Act One, Act Two, and Act Three. Act One was the Old Testament. Act Two is Jesus and Act Three is the Holy Christian Church. Look at the "Timeline of Civilization for Bible Purposes", showing the entire history of Civilization, which consists of about 3,000 years before Jesus (B.C. – Before Christ) and 2,000 years after Jesus (A.D. – Anno Domini – Year of our Lord). Act One is the Old Testament, which is the area on the chart called B.C. (Before Christ). Act Two is the life of Jesus in the New Testament, born about the year zero. And Act Three is the Holy Christian Church, the result of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

What happened after the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ? Christianity officially started on the Day of Pentecost, about 30 A.D. The Day of Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian Church, when the disciples gathered in Jerusalem 50 days after the resurrection and saw the Holy Spirit descend as tongues of fire. This means that the Church has had a huge impact on the world from about 30 A.D. to today, 2024 A.D.

During this period, the Church grew at an extraordinary rate. When Jesus was born, there were no Christians. By 100 A.D., scholars estimate about 8,000 Christians. By 200 A.D., it jumped to about 150,000 Christians. By 300 A.D., it was up to about 3 million Christians. And, by 400 A.D., it reached about 30 million Christians. This was phenomenal growth so by about 400 A.D., Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire.

The growth continued after 400 A.D. Current statistics (2023) for the five World Religions indicate Christianity is the largest religion in the world. Of about 7.6 billion people in the world, about 2.4 billion are Christians, or about 31.3%. About 1.9 million are Islamic, or about 24.8%. About 1.2 billion are Hindu or about 15.2%. About 500,000 are Buddhist, or about 6.6%. Finally, about 14 million are Jewish, or about 0.2%. These five are considered the five "World Religions."


In about 400 A.D., the Roman Empire split into two halves: the eastern half, known as the Byzantine Empire, and the western half, known as Western Civilization. The two halves had very different histories. The Byzantine Empire was a centralized empire that lasted for over 1,000 years, from 400 A.D. until it was conquered by the Muslims in 1453 A.D. The western half of the Roman Empire was fragmented into several smaller countries during the Dark Ages (400 - 1000 A.D.). The High Middle Ages (1000 - 1600 A.D.) produced two important inventions -- the modern university and the start of modern experimental science. This led to the Enlightenment Period (1750-1800), the rise of secularism, and then to the Four Freedoms: political freedom, economic freedom, religious freedom, and intellectual freedom. These are the heritage of Western Civilization.

The overall religious trend in the history of the world has been from an original polytheism throughout the world to the first monotheism in Ancient Israel (the Old Testament), to the second monotheism, Christianity (the New Testament), and eventually to Modern Science and the Enlightenment Period. All of this led to the Four Freedoms of the modern world, a product of Western Civilization.

Why does this Overview of the Bible contain so much history? Because the Bible and the extraordinary growth of Christianity had a huge impact on the history of the world!

Next month, we will examine the four Gospels in detail.

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
